Advent is a time to celebrate the reality of the Incarnation. The birth of Jesus is the entrance of God into our human condition. We sing the familiar carol - "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," which declares that "God is with us". A strong emphasis on the meaning of Advent could help people to rediscover a Biblical understanding of the Christmas season. Advent, at the heart of it, is so much more than a cultural celebration of Christmas. Advent is a joyous celebration of the first coming of God in Jesus. Advent is joyous celebration of the second coming of Jesus as victorious Lord. Advent is a joyous celebration of the daily coming of Jesus in our daily lives.

The holidays, when viewed and experienced as holy days, help people to savor the Savior's presence in this world. When people dread such days, it's because of feelings of emptiness or hollowness. Advent days are meant to fill us with vision, energy, and joy. But for many, the days leading up to the Advent of Jesus can be empty due to shopping weariness and despair.

Advent is meant to be a hallowed time, not a hollowed time. These are days to celebrate with family and friends the God whose child was born to live, days to proclaim hope in a future that rests in God, a future whose seeds are planted in the present situations of our everyday life.

The holy days of Advent leading to Christmas are days to turn to Jesus and His church. These are the days to sing the carols about a God who lives in our "now's" and who invites all people to live in them fully and authentically. This is what Paul meant when he said, "We thank God for the joy we have in his presence because of you" (1 Thessalonians 3:9). The center-

- a variety of whole bean and ground regular and decaf coffees (\$7 for 12-oz pkg; \$8 for 16-oz pkg










Candlelight Service



Small Group Ministry Development

Each month, as stated in the November Connection, you will have the opportunity to read and learn the teaching and significance of Small Groups for CELC's pre-development transition, its active development transition, and its post-development transition.

As stated by Dietrich Bonhoeffer, in his book "Life Together," he opens his first chapter entitled "Community" with Psalms 133:1..."Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" He goes on to state, "It is not simply to be taken for granted that the Christian has the privilege of living among other Christians," but to live amongst and with all people of God". "Christianity means "community" through Jesus Christ and in Jesus Christ. No Christian Community is more or less than this. Whether it be a brief, single encounter or the daily fellowship of years, Christian "community" is only this. We belong to one another only through and in Jesus Christ."

At this time of year—Christmas—we want to be with family and friends, there are Christmas Eve, Christmas Day activities, candlelight services, faith communities, choral activities, vacations, opportunities to spend time just being with others, experience and touch "love"—perhaps with more meaning and spiritual significance—to be "in community".

This brings me to the second topic in the journey of Small Group Ministry Development and Significance—"Why We Need Small Groups". In 2 Corinthians 1:3-7 we find several Biblical reasons "why we need small groups". This passage reads.. The God of All Comfort... 3Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, 4who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves have received from God. 5For just as the sufferings of Christ flow over into our lives, so also through Christ our comfort overflows. 6If we are distressed, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which produces in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we suffer. 7And our hope for you is firm, because we know that just as you share in our sufferings, so also you share in our comfort.

Let us start with Paul's purpose in this writing. It is not to praise God for personal comfort received or to discuss the nature of the gospel ministry. His primary concern is to show the Corinthians [your community/

world] that their lives are inescapably intertwined, so what impacts Paul [you] impacts the Corinthians [your community/friends], and what impacts the Corinthians [your community/world] impacts Paul [you].

Now, you may need to read that last sentence a couple of times, which I do recommend, especially if you are trying to understand it for the context of Small Groups and Small Group Ministry. In any group you are in, whether with family, friends, socially, or professionally, all lives are intertwined.

Comfort and encouragement are variable and significant. A commentary on this passage states, "Against the selfism that is prevalent, even in Christian circles today, it is important to notice two things. First, this provision of comfort is not self-serving, but is intended to equip for service to the church. God comforts us, Paul states, so that we, in turn, can comfort those in any trouble (v. 4). So that we can comfort points to the fact that the means God uses to provide encouragement is other people. This was certainly the case in Paul's life. It is easy to talk about divine comfort in the abstract, but for Paul, God's comfort was very real. It was something he received with Titus's arrival from Corinth (7:6) and something he experienced on hearing the good news about the Corinthian church (7:4). In turn, the comfort that he gained when "harassed at every turn" (7:5) prepared him to give encouragement to those around him (1:5). Suffering, then, is a training ground for service to the body of Christ. It equips us so that we can better minister to those who, for the sake of the gospel, are going through trials and hardships. In this way we mediate God's encouragement."

Also, the first Saturday of each month, 8:00-9:00 am, in The Upper Room, CELC's Small Group Leaders meet and are provided resources and teaching for his/her continued Small Group Leadership development.

During this time of Advent, as you start your day with prayer, may the writing on page 6 be a spiritual guide of comfort and encouragement for you and your loved ones—the true meaning of "Christmas", the Love of Jesus Christ for all!

- * to make a grave for your ugly thoughts, and a garden for your kindly feelings, with the gate open—

Are you willing to do these things, even for a day? Then you can keep Christmas.

Are you willing...

* to believe that love is the strongest thing in the world—stronger than hate, stronger than evil, stronger than death—and that the blessed life which began in Bethlehem nineteen hundred years ago is the image and brightness of the Eternal Love?

Then you can keep Christmas. And if you can keep it for a day, why not always? But you can never keep it alone.


Please prayerfully consider committing three hours of your time in the upcoming months. If you are already participat-



GGT Development Update

Our development program moved forward on a number of fronts during the last quarter of 2007, but we were also faced with some additional delays.

As previously reported, the Montgomery County Planning Board meeting was held on September 6, 2007. After lengthy testimony by both project supporters and opposition, a unanimous vote was rendered by all five commissioners to approve the Local Map Amendment (LMA) application that we submitted in November 2006.

Comments from the Board included how our plan meets all the zoning parameters and the major objectives of the 2006 Woodmont Triangle Amendment to the Bethesda CBD Sector Plan that the Planning Board, and then County Council, approved in January 2006, including

- Provides more residential dwelling units
- Is compatible with the surrounding neighborhood
- Adds improved landscaping and more green space
- Allows for more community services

The end result from the Commissioners was unanimous approval with no additional binding elements. We did hear some constructive comments from Board members and some neighbors that we have already noted for possible adjustments.

The next planned step was an LMA Public Hearing originally scheduled for October 23, which was delayed until late February due to technical opposition from neighbors. That also includes the Hearing Examiner's decision to first have the abandonment of Rugby Road and the alleyway between the parking lot and Glenbrook approved. The abandonment hearing is now scheduled for January 7.

Despite some unplanned and costly delays, our project is moving forward and is gaining wide support and recognition from many community leaders on a local, county, and national basis. We look forward to presenting our case at the January and February hearings. Your continued support and prayers are very much appreciated.

The Sunday morning Christian Challenging Lifestyles small group participants have had a rich and exciting fall season. We meet Sunday at 10:15 am, between worship services, to share the challenges of daily living we encounter and explore how we can respond in a Christian manner through discussion, prayer, and Bible study. Our theme this fall has been "Breaking News!" We're all familiar with this phrase as used by the media to draw attention to the latest story they want to promote as "exciting" or "newsworthy". While much of what comes to us via the newspapers, TV, and the internet is "fluff," there are many serious news stories we need to heed and study.

During the past weeks, participants have brought in stories that bear directly on the challenges of living a Christian life. Some recent ones include tensions over immigrants in the Virginia suburbs; someone who found and returned some lost wallets but was upset because the owners didn't reward her; "alter egos" people use to represent themselves on electronic chat rooms and games and how that relates to the kind of close commu-

nity and group relationships we have been lifting up; and news relating to creation care and the "green living" topics raised in the creation care forums we have been holding.

We bring these and many more "topical" issues, as well as personal experiences and challenges from the week. We never run short of material but always seem to run out of time!

As we cover all these issues, we always turn to the other "breaking news"—the "Good News" of the Gospel and the promise of love and grace we have from God through Jesus Christ. We find verse after verse in the Bible to answer the issues we raise and to shed light on how we should respond. We join in prayer for each other, for our Christian community at large, and for the many who suffer throughout this country and the world—especially since much of the news we hear is of disaster and misfortune. As in other small groups, the caring and concern we have for each other is one of the most important gifts we receive from being together.

As we enter into the Christmas Season, we look forward to remembering that greatest "breaking news" flash of all—the birth of the Christ child two thousand years ago and the continuing gifts we receive from His sacrifice, compassion, and love.

The Table Fall 2007

CELC's Fall "Table" series commenced on November 10 at Laura and Steve North's home. It was truly a significant beginning for the small group in hearing and learning about Jesus' table ministry and how we can apply it to our family and community life. This session of the Table Ministry continues with host Ingrid Dallaire at her home on Saturday, December 8 and with host Paula Mathis at her home on Saturday, January 5.

The Fall Table Ministry is CELC's second Table teaching experience. The next step for CELC's Neighborhood is "The presence of Jesus in every neighborhood..." said Teaching Pastor Randy Frazee. "That's a grand vision. [How can we] "play a role in reaching [family, friends, and our] neighbors for Christ."

The Table is about "community". In the 21st Century, The Table Ministry is one of the ministries to how to teach/learn "Being Jesus to our Neighbors". Pastor Randy states, "We hide the presence of Jesus in little Christian huddles. He wants His presence once again to be on the move. The encouraging news is that it's easier than you might think. It really begins by extending hospitality, with things as simple as hosting a cookout, scraping a neighbor's icy windshield, or—as in recent days—helping to clean out flooded basements, [helping with the Homeless Backpack Ministry, feeding the homeless at CELC]. The vision [of The Table Ministry] can best be accomplished if we partner with all Christians in our neighborhoods, including those who attend other churches." It is not the presence of CELC, Willow Creek, or any church, but the presence of Jesus Christ, in every neighborhood. What a great Christmas gift to the world for our Savior Jesus Christ.

This Christmas season, together with other believers, sincerely ask God what He wants to do in your neighborhood. And when He answers, be ready to respond. If Jesus would do it, you have our blessing. Merry Christmas—Jesus Loves You!

Small Group Ministries

Small Groups are spiritual communities where people share their thoughts, feelings, struggles, and joys, while applying Biblical principles in their lives. Small Groups grow in trusting relationships, and participants agree what is shared will remain confidential and differences of opinions are respected.
